SPANISH MUSIC AND FLAMENCO



The aim of the course is to introduce the students to the basics of Spanish music and Flamenco*, to show them its most famous international expressions and to enjoy listening to and – why not - dancing to it.

Sessions: one two-hour lesson a day for four days (eight hours total)

Course Content

1. Theory (instructor-led)

- What is Flamenco? Myths, origins, background, external influences, its relationship with Spanish and Andalusian music.
- The three forms: Cante Baile Toque
- Musical technical features:
 - a. Rhythm: Flamenco styles; binary, ternary and the twelve-beat cycles
 - b. Melody: scales, modes, characteristic intervals; relevant Flamenco songs
 - c. Harmony: cadences, typical chords, major and minor; Ionian and Phrygian modes
- Lyrics and poetic forms: coplas, estribillos, folk and art poetry, relations between words and instrumental rhythm

2. Audiovisual presentation

- Flamenco's historical characters: Niña de los Peines, Antonio Mairena, Camarón de la Isla, Paco de Lucia, Carmen Amaya
- The Gypsies role: the Farruco's family
- Flamenco and cinema: Carlos Saura and Antonio Gades

3. Practical

 Rhythmical exercises (hand clapping and footwork) and some rudimentary dances on the most common meters. Students are advised to wear sturdy shoes with leather soles and sonorous heels.

Technical Requirements:

Classroom with speakers to listen music/video, blackboard/whiteboard, a piano or a keyboard, overhead projector, DVD viewing facility.

The program could include the collaboration with the flamenco dancer Sara Aresu, who would show some steps and short choreographies directly related to the theoretical lectures.
